# DC'S PHASEOUT OF PUBLIC HEALTH **EMERGENCY TENANT PROTECTIONS**

#### **EVICTION AND UTILITY SHUTOFF BAN**

In certain circumstances, housing providers may start issuing eviction notices to tenants for unpaid rent, as well as intentional damage to rental property, phasing out some of the Public Health Emergency (PHE)-related eviction protections that have been in place in the city since March 2020. Stay informed: Do you know how the phaseout of tenant protections will affect you? Are you struggling to pay your rent or other housing expenses? Housing providers can file to evict tenants over certain safety and property concerns.

### Aug 24:

Pre-Public Health Emergency (PHE) declaration eviction proceedings reopen.\* notices of past due rent.

### **Sep 26:**

Housing providers can issue notices to vacate in all eviction cases.They can also send 60-day

It is not file an eviction action for non-payment of rent unless they have provided tenant with a 60-day notice of rent arrears and meet numerous other requirements.

# **KEY FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS**

### **RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM**

### EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (ERAP)



ERAP supports District residents who earn less than 40 percent of the area median income. The program can specifically help with funding for rent arrears accumulated prior to and during the pandemic. security deposits, and first month's rent payments.





### **HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION PROGRAM AND SERVICE**

### VIRGINIA WILLIAMS FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER (VWFRC)



Families may access emergency housing through VWFRC, the central intake office for all families in the District of Columbia seeking assistance with their housing needs. VWFRC is located at 920 Rhode Island Avenue, NE, Washington, DC, and is open Monday–Thursday, 8:30 am-4:00 pm, and Friday, 8:30 am-12:00 pm.

If you are a family with children under 18 and need emergency shelter, please call the Shelter Hotline at 202-399-7093. The Shelter Hotline is available 24 hours a day.


